Winter is Coming – Check your Vehicle!

With Winter just around the corner the Gnowangerup Community Resource Centre is encouraging all drivers to make sure you and your vehicle remain safe by completing maintenance checks of tyres, lights, wipers, fluids and battery before and regularly during winter..

Carl Beck a Road Safety Advisor for the Great Southern with WALGA said "winter is a time when hazards on the road are higher with, wet slippery conditions, reduced visibility from rain and fog, along with the possibility of tree limbs etc. on roads after storms so it is extremely important that your car is well maintained to assist in keeping you and other community members safe on our roads."

As well as ensuring their vehicle is well maintained other strategies to stay safe on our roads during winter the Gnowangerup Community Resource Centre are encouraging drivers to follow are:

Drive with your lights on at all times to make it easy for other drivers to see you.

Slow down. It is a good idea to drive slowly and carefully in general, but travelling at high speeds is even more dangerous during winter.

Leave more space between yourself and the vehicle in front of you, as breaking/stopping distances on wet roads are increased.

Check the weather forecast when planning your trip and try to avoid driving during sever storm conditions

Personal responsibilities Phase 3 of COVID-19 roadmap to commence from , June 6





Phase 3 will come into effect from Saturday, June 6 (11.59pm Friday, June 5). It includes:

- non-work indoor and outdoor gatherings of up to 100 people at any one time, per single undivided space, up to 300 people in total per venue (100/300 rule);
- food businesses and licensed premises may operate with seated service;
- alcohol may be served without a meal at licensed premises (patrons must be seated);
- food courts can reopen with a seated service;
- beauty therapy and personal care services to reopen;
- saunas, bath houses, float centres, massage and wellness centres to reopen (100/300 rule);
- galleries, museums, theatres, auditoriums, cinemas and concert venues can reopen (during any performance, the patrons must be seated. (100/300 rule));
- Rottnest Island to reopen to the WA general public;
- Perth Zoo to open with no patron limit for the whole venue (the 100/300 rule applies to indoor spaces and cafés/restaurants);
- wildlife and amusement parks can reopen (100/300 rule);
- arcades (including pool/snooker, ten pin bowling, Time zone), skate rinks and indoor play centres to reopen (100/300 rule);
- auction houses and real estate auctions can reopen;
- TAB and other gaming venues (other than the Casino which is being considered separately) are permitted to reopen;
- full contact sport and training is now permitted;
- playgrounds, skate parks and outdoor gym equipment are permitted to be used;
- parents/guardians will be able to enter school grounds to drop off or pick up their children;
- gyms, health clubs and indoor sports centres will be able to offer the normal range of activities, including the use of all gym equipment (gyms must be staffed at all times and undertake regular cleaning).



UPDATE FROM THE TAMBELLUP POLICE



Good day to you all,

The good sergeant is attending to other matters this week so I am writing this month's Topics update – I hope I can fill the previous Topic entry's shoes:

With another month speedily disappearing in to the past, we have been busy with several aspects of policing, varying from Covid-19 related tasks through to community engagement and front-line response.

Most recently, Tambellup has acquired a total of eleven new residential CCTV systems through the partnership between community, Broomehill Tambellup Guard Facebook Page and local police.

Eight CCTV units are now watching the homes of local residents, while one made its way to Wagin and two others to Gnowangerup. The systems are accessible on the home owner's mobile phones and they also record on to a hard drive, making them perfect for evidence retention. With CCTV footage, there's little a burglar or trespasser can say in their defence.

The colder, and certainly more wet weather, is a great reminder to us all on driving defensively and mindfully. Please remember that driving at 110km/hr on our highways is the MAXIMUM speed limit, and not a speed limit you must reach on every journey. Arguably, it would be unsafe to travel drastically under the speed limit on the Great Southern Highway, however your safety is much more important that arriving five minutes early.

Just to harp on a little more about road safety, I ask you to consider the 'physics' of travelling in a motor car. MANY traffic crashes can be prevented. While we marvel at our ever-evolving four-wheeled inventions, the cars we drive are becoming more sophisticated and are being equipped with more safety components. There's reason for this safety increase – we are travelling at speeds we naturally couldn't achieve. This makes us more efficient, however more vulnerable also.

Please remember that one of the main purposes of vehicular safety mechanics is as 'back up' measure to your own driving skills and abilities. Don't become over-reliant on them. After all, where is the line between personal driver accountability and technological accountability? I know I would rather be in control of my journey for now, at least until full automation is as safe as possible. Drive to the conditions. Be it weather, time of day / night, visibility issues etc. On several occasions, Josh and I have negotiated bends along Great Southern highway to find a vehicle travelling towards us on the wrong side of the double-white lines! The collective impact of 220km/hr isn't worth even a split second on your mobile phone or a glance at a radio station. Pick your time to change the radio channel and do not be in control of a vehicle in any way while using your mobile phone. The law isn't always there to ensure people's safety, so it does come back to the individual. Personal accountability goes a long way towards ensuring yours and others' safety on the roads.

Both the sergeant and I were speaking about how impressed we have been with the maturity and general manner Tambellup citizens have responded to the unprecedented Covid-19 restrictions. Thank you for your ongoing personal accountability and responsibility during this time. On that note, please assist the schools to do what they're best at by getting the kids back to school. We are working weekly with department of education and other stake holders in the best interest school retention. We have such a great school and staff here in Tambellup so let's give all our kids the best chance with some of the Tambellup Primary awesomeness.

During the pandemic, the shire generously approved for the sergeant and I to purchase gift bags which included some snacks, drawing items and even 'Scratchies' for the mums and dads. Their purpose was to bring smiles to a few faces we'd noticed have recently been struggling a bit with the isolation laws. Thank you to the shire and also to the Tambellup Deli for looking after us on the prices, making the gift packs stretch further!

On the note of the shire and partnerships, the youth worker traineeship is still going ahead with the hope the Zone will be open soon. The funding which is approved was put on hold until after

Covid-19 was over. If you're interested in the position, please contact Stu Roberts from Impact Services on phone: 9892-7433.

We have been busy with front line duties also, assisting other stations and in the immediate surrounds. Just this weekend, we assisted in the arrests of three high-risk males in Katanning. The result was a more restful sleep for Katanning and we even got a little bit of over time!

Finally, thank you to all who were involved in the recent GWN7 News story about Tambellup. It was rare and refreshing to see a positive news story which also managed to remain grounded and honest. If you haven't seen it, check it out on the GWN7 Facebook Page.






A Guide to Native Orchids of South Western Australia

Rural land prices in Western Australia soar as farmers try to expand their business

A tug-of-war is underway in the agricultural heartlands of Western Australia between farm buyers battling to secure more land and sellers holding out amid a regional price surge.

While the residential real estate market in the metros is struggling, it's a different story in the regions, with land hitting record prices as demand outstrips supply.

A national report conducted in 2019 by the Rural Bank found the median price for agricultural properties in WA had increased by 28.2 per cent.

Nationally the median price of farmland rose by 13.5 per cent.

With more buyers looking for more country than sellers are willing to part with, the tight supply of farmland — less than five per cent having been traded over the year — is pushing values steadily up.

Values in WA reached record highs despite last year's below-average cropping season, with the median price per hectare climbing to \$2,569.

This was something I was really looking forward to because I've always been fascinated with the idea of having an actual theme park with roller coasters and everything inside a shopping centre. had finished ice skating it was time for a mini road trip to Melaka where we spent the remainder of the holiday. Just spending time with Maryam and singing to kpop in the car is an amazing memory I will cherish.

While in Kuala Lumpur I thought I had gotten used to the heat and humidity but on the fourth day waking up in Melaka the heat had been taken to a whole new level. Everywhere we went even whilst in the city we carried 2 litre water bottles around all day to avoid dehydration. This was the perfect time to spend the day at A'Famosa Water Park. I was really excited to try out the wave pool which was a lot of fun to just relax and bob around in. There were also a lot of fun water slides, and friendly people so this was a day well spent. Later that night we walked around the historical city centre in Melaka looking at the intact traditional houses and historic landmarks, learning about the city's colourful past. My friends also surprised me with a birthday cake because we couldn't celebrate my birthday in person. While we were eating cake, across the river was a restaurant and as if by fate the restaurant entertainer started to sing Happy Birthday. We all had a good giggle about that, it was perfect.

On my last day in Malaysia we thought it would be nice to spend the morning at the beach, which is just across the road from my friends' house. Can you imagine that? Living a few steps away from the ocean, that is the dream!. That morning the water was crystal clear and sparkling from the warm reflection of the sun. This was the perfect bittersweet goodbye to Malaysia. On the drive back to Kuala Lumpur I got to try Cendol and Dodol from roadside stalls. Coming back into Australia the vibe was very different from when I had left only a week prior. When I left for Malaysia, things had not been as intense as they are now. All staff were wearing masks and gloves and passing out notices advising people to quarantine themselves for 14 days. From the 11th to the 25th of March I was almost completely restricted to the rooms of my house, besides a short walk around my block with my dog. 



Cancelling contracts during COVID-19

Let's say you'd found the car or caravan of your dreams, even signed on the dotted line, but then the COVID-19 pandemic hit and you could no longer go through with the deal – you may be wondering what costs you're liable to pay.

Consumer Protection has recently received a number of enquiries from consumers in the same position, who want to break the contract of sale due to job losses or travel restrictions, but are concerned about dealers slugging them with a huge fee.

According to the *Motor Vehicle Dealers* (Sales) Regulations 1974 (WA), a dealer may seek **up to** 15 per cent of the purchase price as pre-estimated liquidated damages if the contract is validly terminated as a result of a breach by the purchaser.

Even though 15 per cent is the maximum amount that can be charged, dealers should not be applying it as the default position. Any fee charged has to be a genuine and reasonable assessment of losses the dealer is likely to incur as a result of the deal not proceeding. These losses may for example include interest charges if the vehicle was part of the dealer's floor plan, costs incurred as a result of preparing the vehicle for delivery, plus any transportation and administration costs.

It's also worth noting that a consumer is entitled to receive their full deposit back and not be charged any pre-estimated damages if:

- the contract is broken because the dealer has breached their obligations:
- the consumer withdrew their offer before the dealer accepted it; or
- the consumer can't meet their contractual obligations despite taking all reasonable steps to
 do so, because the consumer is unable to obtain finance in circumstances where the
 contract to purchase the vehicle was subject to finance.

Consumer Protection is encouraging dealers and their customers to negotiate in good faith in situations where the contract to purchase cannot be met due to COVID-19.

If a consumer feels the amount of pre-estimated liquidated damages sought by a dealer is excessive, they can lodge a complaint with Consumer Protection for investigation: https://www.commerce.wa.gov.au/consumer-protection/how-lodge-formal-complaint

More rental homes go to pot

It's every landlord's worst nightmare – receiving a call from the police with the news their investment property has been turned into a hydroponic cannabis farm.

Unfortunately that's the reality for a growing number of Western Australian landlords recently, following further raids by the Organised Crime Squad, which continues investigating networks of Vietnamese crime gangs posing as tenants to use rental homes for this purpose.

Private landlords advertising through classified sites such as Gumtree are most often targeted, as they are believed to be less likely to carry out stringent checks on prospective tenants and be less suspicious of a large upfront cash payment to cover rent.

Driver's licences provided as identification are either stolen or fake, while references supplied by the applicants are usually other gang members posing as employers or previous landlords.

These grow-houses can have a devastating financial impact— aside from the damage and clean-up bills, affected landlords also suffer the loss of rental income while the home is being repaired.

Then there is the risk of fire and electrocution to the occupants and neighbours, as these operations combine a watering system with electricity bypassed from the meter to create a new electrical system to power the hydroponics.

Stay vigilant by knowing the signs:

- Cash rentals paid several months in advance;
- A large number of people frequently coming to the house for two to three hours at a time;
- Humming or bright lights coming from the house at night;
- · Windows constantly covered; and
- Evidence of tampering with power or meter boxes.

If landlords choose not to go through a real estate agent or property manager, they need to do thorough checks on applicants and carry out a property inspection soon after they move in and at regular intervals up to the maximum of four inspections a year that are allowed.

FATALITY FREE FRIDAY 2020 WEST AUSTRALIA FACT SHEET

There should never be an excuse to take risks on or around our roads. Sadly, many West Australians still do and the complacency of fewer cars on the road during coronavirus is driving more dangerous behaviour:

- One in four West Australian drivers (25%) admit to taking road risks since the implementation of Covid-19 lockdowns
- A frightening statistic, likely driven by the fact that two thirds of West Australians (69%) believe the roads are safer under current conditions
- And while you might have expected the road toll to reflect the minimal vehicles on the road, the national year-to-date road toll has only declined by 12.5% compared to the same period last year
- Speeding is the most common risk being taken by West Australian drivers during Covid-19 lockdown conditions (16% more), followed by using a mobile phone behind the wheel 10% higher), or driving after a few drinks (6% spike)

Speed is already the most common form of bad driving behaviour, but it's just one of many risks that together are creating an unacceptable amount of risk for road users:

- Four in five West Australians (76%) admit to breaking a road law. Those taking risks are more likely to be metro drivers (78%) rather than regional drivers (68%)
- When it came to excuses for this dangerous behaviour, the most common were: not paying attention (36%), a brief lapse in judgement (26%), or simply believing it was "safe" to do so (22%)
- Speeding is the most common with over two thirds of the state's drivers admitting to speeding, but
 what's more, is it's happening at an alarming frequency. In fact, one in three drivers (25%) admit to
 speeding on at least a weekly basis, while a further 40% of drivers admit to speeding at least once
 every few months
- Again, the majority of the state's drivers who admitted to speeding were metro based (67%) compared to regional (58%)
- Added to this, distraction continues to be a common safety issue in the car. More than half admit to
 eating while driving, a quarter admit to using their mobile phone, and one in four admit to looking
 away from the road at GPS or music for more than two seconds (which doubles your chance of a
 crash)
- · A quarter of West Australian drivers also admit to driving over the legal alcohol limit
- But the state's drivers are not only a danger when behind the wheel, almost half also admit to
 pedestrian risks like jaywalking, a third of cyclists admit to riding without a helmet, and a quarter of
 passengers admit to distracting their driver

- Shockingly, only 9% of the state's drivers think about the safety of other road users when behind the

- Further, West Australians are also nine times more likely to book a holiday, buy something frivolous for themselves or spend a night out with friends, when compared to fixing a vehicle's safety issue



LOCAL AUTHORITIES LOSE ROAD FUNDS TO PAY FOR REFERENDUMS

Wilson Tuckey said "that the Hawke Labor Govern-ment had slashed road fund-ing from the 1988/89 forward-estimate, a cut of \$50 mil-lion or 4 per cent, which rep-resents a drop of more than

10 per cent in real terms".

Wilson Tuckey said that "this reduction of \$50 million was almost exactly the amount needed to pay for the four unnecessary Referendum questions that this socialist Government is planning to put to the people in September".

"This move is another slap in the face for Local Government, which has campaigned heavily for necessary increases, especially those in rural areas who have many local roads to maintain, and clearly shows just how little understanding the Hawke Government has of the needs for this type of infrastructure for viable rural production."

He said that "last year the Government had reduced road funding by \$1 million and has not increased its road funding in either nominal or real terms since 1984/85, representing a cut of almost

al or real terms since 1984/85, representing a cut of almost 40 per cent in road construction and repair. Wilson Tuckey said that "this current blow of \$50 million for 1988/89 means that Local Authorities have returned to the funding of 1983/84 which was \$1,200 million (1983/84 dollars)".

"I have noted your com-ments about the small propor-tion of the Federal Govern-ment's fuel excise allocated

"For many years, Federal "For many years, rederan Governments have adopted the principle that fuel taxes are a source of revenue for gen-eral Government expenditure. "I would therefore be un-realistic to argue that all the fuel excise should be spent on roads.

"The Government submission proposed an increase in the amount of fuel excise to be dedicated to roads which would restore total Federal road funding to its 1985/86 level in real terms."

It is an idicator of the lack of suitable funding by the State and Federal Governments that as 1988/89 approaches, the Hon. Minister can talk of funding being restored to 1985/86 levels for roadworks.

It does at least indicate an acknowledgement that funding has been severely neglected in the recent years of the

in the recent years of the Hawke Government to the

detriment of local roads.

It would be difficut to es-It would be difficult to es-tablish another item in the whole economy that in this day and age would cost in 1988/89 what it cost in 1985/86.

1985/86.

This is obviously not the view shared by the Premier Mr. Dowding, who was happy to accept further cuts to the States at the recent Premiers conference, safe in the knowledge that he could again simply increase prices to cover the loss and obviously, without regard to such areas of road funding.

The Treasurer Mr. Keating The Treasurer Mr. Keating obviously does not regard the upgrading of roads and the subsequent saving of lives as a priority; as the announcement in the May Economic Statement of a further cut of \$50 million to road funding for the coming budget is sure to increase the problem further for especially local roads and Local Authorities.

of disrepair and are imposing significant costs on users in extra fuel consumption, tyre

extra fuel consumption, tyre wear and other vehicle operating expenses."

Mr. Allwright drew attention to work done by the National Asociation of Australian State Road Authorities (NAASRA) which shows that 27 pre cent of rural arterial roads provide a poor service. "Given further deregulation of transport this statistic is not likely to improve without an injection of more funds." he said.

Mr. Allwright said there were sizeable benefits to be obtained from investing in roads.

"A \$1 million rural arteri-"A \$1 million rural arteri-al road project would on av-erage save susers of that road \$1.2 million in vehicle oper-ating costs, \$1 million in time savings and yield \$0.8 million in other benefits such as re-duced road accidents," he said.





The Exhibits were executed by the Baldjamaar Foundation and supporting services, as part of a display of unity to mark National Reconciliation Week.


Baldjamaar Foundation CEO Damien Yarran said "The display would remind the community of the importance of working towards ongoing reconciliation".






